## MAKING THE WOLVES

**JAN. 25, 1994**

The International Hockey League grants franchise rights to Don Levin and Grant Mulvey to operate a team in Chicago, called the Chicago Wolves, with home games at the Rosemont Horizon. Ex-Blackhawk Mulvey is named president/general manager and Wayne Messmer is chosen as senior vice president.

**JAN. 28, 1994**

The Wolves officially announce the franchise and name the Horizon as its home rink. The Horizon debuts plans for a \$4 million renovation project that includes a state-of-the-art ice-making system.

**FEB. 21, 1994**

The Wolves receive more than 1,000 calls on the first day season tickets go on sale.

**APRIL 27, 1994**

Ground is broken on the Horizon renovation project; the first objective is to build new locker rooms.

**JULY 14, 1994**

The Wolves announce Gene Ubriaco as their first assistant general manager/head coach, which marks the eighth time the experienced architect of pro hockey teams is hired for an inaugural season.

**AUG. 12, 1994**

The Wolves announce WCBR "The Bear" (92.7 FM) as the official radio home of the Wolves; the station reveals plans to carry all 81 regular-season games and playoff games live for the 1994-95 season.

**AUG. 23, 1994**

The Wolves announce their inaugural season schedule.

**OCT. 1, 1994**

The Wolves begin their inaugural season with a 6-5 shootout loss against the Detroit Vipers at the Palace of Auburn Hills.

**OCT. 14, 1994**

A sellout crowd of 16,623 celebrates the Wolves' first

home game and 4-2 victory against Detroit. The event begins with the emotional return of Wayne Messmer, who sings the national anthem publicly for the first time since being shot in the throat during a robbery attempt on April 9, 1994.

**NOV. 23, 1994**

Left wing Steve Maltais records the Wolves' first hat trick as part of a 7-4 road victory against the Cleveland Lumberjacks.

**FEB. 10, 1995**

Goaltender Ray LeBlanc registers a 1994-95 IHL season-high 51 saves during a 5-2 loss at Milwaukee.

**MARCH 19, 1995**

Left wing Steve Maltais collects three goals, including his 50th goal of the season, and three assists during a 7-3 victory over the Las Vegas Thunder in front of 16,144 fans. The Wolves also honor 8-year-old Paul Munda of Elmwood Park as the 400,000th fan to attend a Wolves game.

**APRIL 9, 1995**

A total of 13,539 fans enjoy the final regular-season game, which wraps up the Wolves' first-place finish in IHL paid attendance for the 1994-95 season.

**MAY 11, 1995**

The Wolves and WCIU-TV Channel 26 announce a multi-year agreement that enables fans to see Wolves games on TV for free. At least 22 home and road contests, a preseason special and a weekly "Wolves TV" show are part of the first year of the deal.

**MARCH 1, 1996**

Grant Mulvey steps behind the bench for the first time as interim head coach, replacing Gene Ubriaco. The Wolves respond with a 4-3 win against the Fort Wayne Komets, their second victory in 10 games. Chicago finishes March with a then-franchise record 10-4-2 mark.

**MARCH 9, 1996**

Right wing Rob Brown posts an assist during Chicago's 4-3 loss against Milwaukee to become the first player in club history to reach the 100-point mark in a single season.

**MARCH 10, 1996**

Left wing Steve Maltais collects his fifth hat trick of the season, which includes his 100th goal in a Wolves uniform, during Chicago's 6-5 loss at Milwaukee.

**MARCH 24, 1996**

The Wolves shell Kansas City 10-3 and set team records for most goals in a game (10); most power-play goals in a game (8); most goals in a period (6); and largest margin of victory (7). Right wing Rob Brown collects an IHL season-high and franchise-record eight points and six assists, while Steve Maltais tallies a pair of goals to become only the 12th player in IHL history to record back-to-back 50-goal seasons.

**APRIL 28, 1996**

Chicago advances to the second round of the Turner Cup Playoffs for the first time in team history with a 2-1 overtime victory in Game 4 against the San Francisco Spiders. Defenseman Kevin Pozzo's first professional playoff goal at the 1:53 mark of overtime lifts the Wolves to the 3-1 series triumph.

**SEPT. 4, 1996**

Grant Mulvey is named head coach of the Wolves and continues to serve as the organization's president and general manager.

**MARCH 7, 1997**

Grant Mulvey is relieved of his duties as president, general manager and head coach. The team names Finland native Alpo Suhonen as its interim head coach. Suhonen leads the team to a 9-5-1 mark the rest of the season.

**MARCH 19, 1997**

Left wing Steve Maltais nets his 50th goal of the season, becoming the fifth player in the IHL's 52-year history

to record three consecutive 50-goal campaigns.

**MAY 30, 1997**

Left wing Tim Breslin is named the IHL's Amway/Nutrilite Man of the Year and receives the I. John Snider II Trophy for his outstanding community service.

**SEPT. 4, 1997**

The Wolves name John Anderson as the fifth head coach in team history after Alpo Suhonen decides not to return due to personal commitments in Europe. Kevin Cheveldayoff is named general manager while Gene Ubriaco shifts his role in the organization to director of hockey operations/assistant general manager.

**MARCH 27, 1998**

Chicago clinches its first Midwest Division title with a 5-3 win against Milwaukee.

**APRIL 12, 1998**

Goaltender Wendell Young collects his 100th win with the Wolves as Chicago defeats the Milwaukee Admirals 7-5 in the regular-season finale. The Wolves finish the 1997-98 regular season with franchise records in wins (55), points (113), home wins (29) and road wins (26). Chicago's 55 wins and 29 victories on home ice lead the IHL.

**APRIL 22, 1998**

Behind a 40-save performance by goaltender Wendell Young, the Wolves earn a 1-0 Game 3 victory over the Manitoba Moose to sweep the Western Conference Quarterfinal and earn the franchise's first sweep. Chicago advances to the second round of the playoffs for the second time in team history, while the shutout is the first in franchise postseason history.

**MAY 11, 1998**

Powered by center Steve Larouche's hat trick, the Wolves defeat the Milwaukee Admirals 4-3 in Game 6 to wrap up their best-of-seven Western Conference Semifinal. Chicago advances

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to the Western Conference Final for the first time.

**MAY 26, 1998**

After seeing their 3-0 lead in the Western Conference Final slip to 3-2, the Wolves eliminate the Long Beach Ice Dogs with a 7-4 Game 6 victory at Long Beach Arena. With the win, Chicago captures the Ken Ulliyot Trophy that goes to the IHL's Western Conference champion and earns the team's first berth in the Turner Cup Final.

**JUNE 15, 1998**

Backed by 16,701 fans, the second-largest crowd in Turner Cup Final history, the Wolves shut out the Detroit Vipers 3-0 in Game 7 to capture their first Turner Cup Championship. The triumph caps the IHL's first seven-game championship series in 13 years. Chicago wins the last two games of the series to become only the sixth team in the IHL's 53-year history to rebound from a 3-2 deficit in the Final. Wolves center Alexander Semak walks away with the N.R. "Bud" Poile Trophy as the postseason's most valuable player.

**OCT. 10, 1998**

With a regular-season franchise-record 18,339 in attendance, the Wolves kick off their first IHL season as defending Turner Cup Champions with a banner-raising ceremony and a 3-2 victory against the Grand Rapids Griffins. It marks the first time in team history that Chicago opens the season on home ice.

**DEC. 2, 1998**

The Wolves record their 100th victory on home ice by defeating the Orlando Solar Bears 7-4.

**FEB. 22, 1999**

The Hockey News votes Chicago's logo the best in major professional hockey (excluding the NHL) for the second year in a row. The Wolves become the first repeat winner in the history of the logo-ranking

competition.

**APRIL 10, 1999**

With three goals against the Fort Wayne Komets — his team-leading second hat trick of the season — Wolves left wing Steve Maltais becomes the IHL's most prolific goal-scorer over a five-year span with 274 goals from 1994-99. He surpasses the mark of 271 registered by Muskegon Lumberjacks right wing Dave Michayluk from 1984-89.

**APRIL 11, 1999**

By defeating the Detroit Vipers 3-1 in Rosemont, the Wolves capture their second straight Midwest Division title. The victory also secures the second-best record in the Western Conference and a first-round bye in the playoffs.

**JUNE 3, 1999**

Center Chris Marinucci is named the IHL's Man of the Year. He receives the I. John Snider II Trophy, given to the player who has distinguished himself through unselfish donation of time and other resources to charitable and educational efforts within his community.

**FEB. 9, 2000**

Goaltender Wendell Young becomes the first goaltender in franchise history to record shutouts in back-to-back starts. Chicago defeats the Michigan K-Wings 6-0 on Feb. 1 before blanking the Manitoba Moose 2-0 on Feb. 9.

**FEB. 23, 2000**

Captain Steve Maltais records his 300th goal in a Wolves uniform during a 3-2 home loss against the Orlando Solar Bears.

**MARCH 17, 2000**

The Wolves set a franchise-record 12-game winning streak with a 4-3 shootout win against the Kansas City Blades at Kemper Arena.

**MARCH 30, 2000**

With a 4-3 shootout win against the Houston Aeros at the Compaq Center, the Wolves set a franchise-

record nine-game road winning streak.

**APRIL 16, 2000**

The Wolves beat the defending Turner Cup Champion Houston Aeros 5-3 in the regular-season finale to capture their first Fred A. Huber, Jr., Memorial Trophy, which symbolizes the IHL's regular-season championship. Left wing Steve Maltais collects his first league scoring title, the Leo P. Lamoureux Trophy, with 90 points along with his sixth consecutive IHL season posting 40 or more goals.

**MAY 3, 2000**

The Wolves eliminate the Long Beach Ice Dogs and goaltender Nikolai Khabibulin with a 4-1 win in Game 4 of the Western Conference Semifinal, which marks the franchise's first sweep in a best-of-seven series.

**MAY 9, 2000**

Captain Steve Maltais captures the IHL's Ironman Award to become the first member of the Wolves to receive the accolade. The award is given to the player who plays in each one of his team's regular-season games and displays outstanding offensive and defensive skills.

**MAY 23, 2000**

The Wolves advance to the Turner Cup Final for the second time in three years by defeating the defending Turner Cup champion Houston Aeros with four consecutive wins, including three on the road, in the best-of-seven series. Chicago becomes the sixth (and final) team in IHL history to win a playoff series after dropping the first two games and the third team to do it after losing the first two games at home.

**JUNE 1, 2000**

Center Steve Larouche receives the IHL's John Cullen Award as the Comeback Player of the Year. He is the first Wolves player to be honored with

the award, which is annually given to the player deemed as a key contributor to his team while overcoming injury, illness or other personal obstacles. Larouche scored 13 goals and 38 points in 33 games with the Wolves during the 1998-99 season before suffering a season-ending knee injury against the Detroit Vipers on Dec. 29, 1998. He rebounded in 1999-2000 to lead the IHL with 57 assists and finish second in the league with 88 points.

**JUNE 3, 2000**

Wolves fans set an IHL playoff attendance record when 18,412 spectators crowd into Allstate Arena for Game 5 of the Turner Cup Final.

**JUNE 5, 2000**

After the Wolves and Griffins play a scoreless first period, center Derek Plante notches two goals 26 seconds apart in the second period to set the tone for a 3-1 Game 6 victory at Van Andel Arena and the Wolves' second Turner Cup Championship in three years. With the victory, Chicago becomes the 16th team in league history to capture multiple IHL championships (1998 and 2000). Wolves goaltender Andrei Trefilov is awarded the N.R. "Bud" Poile Trophy as the Turner Cup Playoffs most valuable player. He led the league during the postseason in goals-against average (1.35) and save percentage (.950).

**JULY 11, 2000**

Wolves Chairman of the Board Don Levin is awarded the IHL's Andy Mulligan Trophy as the Executive of the Year for the first time.

**SEPT. 26, 2000**

Goaltender Rick DiPietro, the first overall pick in the 2000 NHL Entry Draft, is assigned to the Wolves by the New York Islanders. DiPietro was the first goaltender during the modern entry draft era (1969-present) to be taken with the first pick. He was selected after compiling

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an 18-5-5 record, 2.45 goals-against average and .913 save percentage as a freshman at Boston University in 1999-2000.

**NOV. 2, 2000**

In the 500th game for both teams, the Detroit Vipers take advantage of home ice to edge the Wolves 6-5 at the Palace of Auburn Hills.

**JAN. 15, 2001**

Chicago hosts the 2001 IHL All-Star Game at Allstate Arena. The Wolves defeat the IHL All-Stars 4-0 to earn the only shutout in an IHL All-Star Game.

**APRIL 5, 2001**

Goaltender Wendell Young is named the IHL's Goaltender of the Month for March, the Wolves' third consecutive monthly goaltender honor. In the league's documented history dating back to 1993-94, no other team earned the Goaltender of the Month award for three straight months. Young posts a 6-1-0 mark, including two shutouts, a 1.29 goals-against average and .956 save percentage.

**APRIL 15, 2001**

The Wolves clinch the regular-season Western Conference title for the second consecutive year with a 3-0 shutout against the Manitoba Moose. Goaltender Richard Shulmstra remains perfect against the Moose, ending the regular season 5-0-0 against Manitoba, while head coach John Anderson collects his 200th win with the Wolves.

**APRIL 27, 2001**

Center Steve Larouche records a franchise postseason-record four goals to boost the Wolves past the Admirals 5-2 in Game 5 of the Western Conference Semifinal. The win gives Chicago its fourth consecutive trip to the Western Conference Final.

**MAY 15, 2001**

The Wolves rally from a three-goal deficit against

the Manitoba Moose with five unanswered goals, including four in the third period, to defeat the Moose 6-4 in Game 6 of the Western Conference Final. Chicago secures its third trip in four years to the Turner Cup Final.

**MAY 17, 2001**

Goaltender Wendell Young is named the 2001 IHL Man of the Year for his outstanding community service during the 2000-01 regular season, the third time in five years a Wolves player receives the honor. On June 27, Young earns the US Airways Professional Hockey Players' Association Player of the Year award, which is presented annually to the PHPA member exemplifying outstanding charitable service in his community.

**JUNE 4, 2001**

After seven years in the IHL and two Turner Cup Championships in the last four, the Wolves join the American Hockey League. The Wolves sign a multi-year agreement to become the primary affiliate of the Atlanta Thrashers of the National Hockey League. Left wing Steve Maltais, right wing Rob Brown and defenseman Bob Nardella all agree to terms for another season with the Wolves.

**AUG. 2, 2001**

The Wolves release the schedule for their inaugural AHL season. They're slated to take on eight new opponents during the 80-game regular season.

**AUG. 21, 2001**

Goaltender Wendell Young retires after 18 professional seasons, including seven with the Wolves. Young, who has been with the team since its inception, caps his career as the franchise leader in games played by a goaltender (322), wins (169), saves (8,467) and shutouts (18). He joins the front office staff as the executive director of team relations.

**DEC. 1, 2001**

The Wolves retire former

goaltender Wendell Young's jersey, the first time in Wolves history that a number is retired.

**MARCH 27, 2002**

Chicago defeats the Hartford Wolf Pack 4-1 at Allstate Arena to clinch its eighth consecutive playoff berth and first in the AHL.

**APRIL 6, 2002**

Left wing Steve Maltais notches a goal in his 1,000th professional game, a 3-2 loss against the Grand Rapids Griffins at Allstate Arena.

**APRIL 11, 2002**

Left wing Zdenek Blatny registers his second consecutive game-winning goal against Cincinnati as the Wolves advance to the Western Conference Quarterfinal against the Grand Rapids Griffins.

**MAY 7, 2002**

The Wolves become the second team in the AHL's 66-year history to play three winner-take-all games – and the first to win all three decisive games – with a 6-2 victory against the top-seeded Syracuse Crunch in Game 7 of the Western Conference Semifinal. With the win, Chicago advances to the conference final for the fifth consecutive year.

**JUNE 3, 2002**

The Wolves clinch their third championship in five years when center Yuri Butsayev scores 2:05 into the second overtime of Game 5 to defeat Bridgeport 4-3 and capture the Calder Cup championship at Allstate Arena. The Wolves, who played a league-high 105 games during the course of the season (including a league-record 25 playoff games), become the sixth team in AHL history to win the championship in their inaugural season. Goaltender Pasi Nurminen is awarded the Jack A. Butterfield Trophy as the playoff MVP as he posts a league-leading and franchise-high 15 wins. Right wing Rob Brown,

who notches three assists in the Game 5 victory, leads the league during the postseason with a then-franchise record 33 points and ties an AHL and team record with 26 assists. Left wing Steve Maltais sets a franchise record with his second hat trick of the postseason and leads the league with 12 goals during the playoffs.

**JUNE 5, 2002**

With the addition of two new teams, the AHL realigns its six divisions. The Wolves continue to play in the West Division, where they're joined by three traditional rivals – the Houston Aeros, Milwaukee Admirals and Utah Grizzlies – as well as the expansion San Antonio Rampage.

**APRIL 4, 2003**

Defenseman Kurtis Foster collects his 14th goal of the season to eclipse the team's single-season record for goals by a defenseman – breaking the mark established by Bob Nardella in 1997-98. Foster ends the season with 15 goals.

**APRIL 6, 2003**

Left wing Steve Maltais records a season-high four points (3G, A) to snag the league scoring title on the final day of the regular season. Maltais edges the runner-up, Houston's Jean-Guy Trudel, by just one point. He records an assist on right wing J.P. Vigier's goal with six seconds remaining in regulation to claim the title.

**APRIL 20, 2003**

The Wolves shut out the Hershey Bears 6-0 in Game 4 of the Western Conference Quarterfinal at the Giant Center, which sets a franchise record for the most decisive playoff victory on the road.

**APRIL 22, 2003**

Chicago scores in overtime of the decisive Game 5 to defeat the Hershey Bears in the Western Conference Quarterfinal. The Wolves register 16 goals against the

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Bears during the series to set a since-broken franchise record for most goals in a five-game series. The two teams combine for 28 goals to record a since-broken franchise high for goals by both teams in a five-game series.

**MAY 2, 2003**

Right wing Rob Brown plays his final professional hockey game. The 21-year veteran finishes his career ranked second in Wolves history in points (483) and assists (326) during 369 regular-season games spanning five seasons.

**JULY 10, 2003**

The AHL realigns into two conferences composed of two divisions each. The Wolves remain in the West Division and are joined by the Cincinnati Mighty Ducks, Grand Rapids Griffins, Houston Aeros, Milwaukee Admirals, San Antonio Rampage and Utah Grizzlies.

**SEPT. 23, 2003**

The Wolves and Comcast announce that all 80 regular-season games and all playoff games will be broadcast. It marks the first TV package of its size and scope in AHL annals.

**OCT. 5, 2003**

Six days after suffering major head injuries in a car accident, former Wolves center Dan Snyder passes away. Snyder was an integral member of the 2002 Calder Cup championship team and devoted himself to community work throughout the Chicago area during his two seasons with the franchise.

**FEB. 17, 2004**

The Hockey News names Wolves goaltender Kari Lehtonen as the top NHL prospect in the world for the second consecutive year.

**MARCH 27, 2004**

The Wolves organization honors Dan Snyder with warm-up jerseys featuring his No. 19, raising a banner in the Allstate Arena rafters and hosting a

special pregame ceremony celebrating his life. Center Derek MacKenzie tallies his first professional hat trick in the 4-2 win against the Milwaukee Admirals.

**MARCH 29, 2004**

Chairman of the Board Don Levin and the Wolves are featured on the ESPN series "Outside the Lines."

**APRIL 23, 2004**

The Wolves set a franchise postseason record for goals during an 8-2 victory over the Grand Rapids Griffins in Game 4 of the West Division Semifinal at Allstate Arena. The Wolves sweep the best-of-seven series and set a franchise record for win-loss percentage in April with a 9-1 record.

**JUNE 3, 2004**

Wolves defenseman Kurtis Foster is named the AHL's Man of the Year. It is the fourth time a Wolves player has won the award. No other team in the NHL, IHL or AHL was recognized as many times for a player's community service from 1995 to 2004.

**JUNE 30, 2004**

The Wolves and Comcast Cable are named the 2003-04 recipient of the AHL's James H. Ellery Memorial Award for their outstanding coverage of the AHL in the category of television media.

**SEPT. 22, 2004**

Left wing Steve Maltais re-signs for his 11th and final season with the Wolves. Maltais is the only player to skate in each of the Wolves' first 11 seasons.

**JAN. 4, 2005**

Goaltender Kari Lehtonen is named the Goaltender of the Month for December, the first time a Wolves netminder is recognized with that award in the AHL. He compiled a 9-1-0 mark, a 1.70 goals-against average, a .948 save percentage and two shutouts.

**JAN. 17, 2005**

The Hockey News names

goaltender Kari Lehtonen the first-half MVP of the AHL.

**JAN. 19, 2005**

Left wing Steve Maltais nets his 600th career professional goal during a 6-3 loss to the Hamilton Bulldogs at the Allstate Arena. Maltais earns the AHL's January Milestone of the Month award for the feat.

**JAN. 30, 2005**

The Wolves and the Hoffman Estates Park District hold a grand opening celebration of the team's new practice facility and the Hoffman Estates Park District Community Center and Ice Arena. The facility opened its doors in November after undergoing a \$12.5 million renovation and expansion.

**MARCH 11, 2005**

The Wolves come from behind to defeat the Hamilton Bulldogs 4-3 at the Copps Coliseum in the franchise's 1,000th game – regular season and playoffs.

**MARCH 16, 2005**

Goaltender Kari Lehtonen earns his 33rd win of the season during a 3-2 victory against the Edmonton Roadrunners at Allstate Arena, surpassing Wendell Young's franchise-best mark of 32 wins. Lehtonen finishes the year with 38 wins, second-most in the AHL.

**APRIL 7, 2005**

Defenseman Travis Roche is named to the 2004-05 AHL First All-Star team, while right wing J.P. Vigier and goaltender Kari Lehtonen are selected to the Second All-Star team. The Wolves top all teams with three All-Star representatives, marking the first time since the 1998-99 season Chicago has three players garner regular-season All-Star selections.

**APRIL 16, 2005**

Chicago defeats the Utah Grizzlies 5-1 at Allstate Arena in the regular-season finale to claim the West Division title, its first AHL division

crown.

**APRIL 17, 2005**

The regular season ends with the Wolves averaging an AHL-high 9,209 fans per home game, marking the second time in franchise history the team leads a league in attendance.

**MAY 25, 2005**

The Wolves defeat the Manitoba Moose 4-1 in Game 4 of the Western Conference Final at the MTS Centre to earn their fifth postseason sweep in franchise history and reach their fifth league final in eight seasons.

**JUNE 10, 2005**

Members of the Wolves alumni and the Chicago Blackhawks alumni face off in "The Breslin Cup" at All-State Arena. The landmark event showcases legendary Chicago hockey players to benefit the Tim Breslin Family Trust.

**JUNE 28, 2005**

The Wolves stay in the AHL's West Division after the 27-team league re-aligns its two-conference, four-division format for the 2005-06 season. Chicago will compete against three new rivals: the Iowa Stars, Omaha Ak-Sar-Ben Knights and Peoria Rivermen.

**DEC. 30, 2005**

The Wolves establish a franchise record with 11 goals – an AHL season-high – as they pound the Peoria Rivermen 11-5 at Allstate Arena. Chicago also shatters team marks for goals at home, goals in a period (seven in the second frame) and player points (28).

**JAN. 18, 2006**

Chicago earns its 500th all-time regular-season victory with a 7-3 win against the Omaha Ak-Sar-Ben Knights at Allstate Arena. Captain Derek MacKenzie leads the way with three goals, the 51st regular-season hat trick in Wolves annals.

**APRIL 20, 2006**

Defenseman Bob Nardella announces his retirement

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from professional hockey. Nardella, a member of the inaugural Wolves squad in 1994-95, finishes his career ranked third in club history with 239 assists and 298 points. His 553 regular-season games hold second all-time.

**AUG. 25, 2006**

The Wolves name Todd Nelson, who guided the UHL's Muskegon Fury to back-to-back Colonial Cups in 2004 and 2005, as the team's new assistant coach. Nelson replaces Marty Howe, who left to rejoin his family business.

**SEPT. 12, 2006**

The Wolves hold a news conference to name Chicago native and former National Hockey League broadcaster Pat Foley the team's play-by-play announcer. He replaces Judd Sirott, who departs the team to become the play-by-play announcer for the NHL on HDNet. Sirott had been the voice of the Wolves since the team's inception in 1994, which included serving as the team's lead TV announcer for the past 10 seasons. Foley, a member of the Chicago Sports Hall of Fame, brings more than 25 years of professional hockey experience behind the microphone.

**DEC. 1, 2006**

Left wing Brett Sterling is named AHL Rookie of the Month for November, becoming the first Wolves player to earn that league honor.

**DEC. 15, 2006**

In the franchise's 500th regular-season game at Allstate Arena, Chicago defeats the Omaha Ak-Sar-Ben Knights 9-1 to match club records for the largest margin of victory and most decisive win on home ice. The Wolves equal a franchise record with six markers in the second period.

**DEC. 26, 2006**

Right wing Darren Haydar establishes a franchise record by collecting a point in his 33rd consecutive

game during Chicago's 5-4 overtime victory at the Milwaukee Admirals.

**JAN. 9, 2007**

Right wing Darren Haydar is held scoreless for the first time all season in the team's 40th outing of the year, a 2-1 loss to the Peoria Rivermen. Haydar tallied 24 goals and 55 assists during his 39-game point streak, which finished as the longest in the AHL's 71-year existence and matched Wayne Gretzky's 1985-86 stretch with the Edmonton Oilers as the fourth-longest streak in professional hockey history.

**JAN. 12, 2007**

The Wolves welcome the franchise's 5 millionth fan, Glenview resident Stephanie Pappas, to Allstate Arena.

**APRIL 4, 2007**

Defenseman Nathan Oystriick and left wing Brett Sterling are named to the AHL's All Rookie Team, becoming the first Wolves to earn the honor. Later, Sterling and right wing Darren Haydar are named to the AHL's First All-Star Team, while Oystriick earns Second All-Star Team honors.

**APRIL 12, 2007**

Left wing Brett Sterling is honored with the franchise's first Dudley "Red" Garrett Memorial Award as the AHL's outstanding rookie. He finishes his first professional campaign with an AHL-leading 55 goals, which earns the Willie Marshall Award as the league's top goal scorer. His total represents the most by a Wolves player in eight years and the fourth-highest total in franchise history.

**APRIL 13, 2007**

Right wing Darren Haydar is named the recipient of the Les Cunningham Award as the American Hockey League's most valuable player for the 2006-07 season. That night, Haydar tallies two points (G, A) to help Chicago tie a league and franchise record with 27 road wins as they earn a 4-3 shootout win over

Milwaukee at Bradley Center. Haydar goes to finish the regular season with a career-high and AHL-best 122 points to earn the John B. Sollenberger Trophy as the league's scoring leader. The 27-year-old forward also paces the league with a career-high 81 assists and shares third with a career-best 41 goals.

**APRIL 25, 2007**

Chicago earns a 3-2 overtime win over Milwaukee in Game 4 of the West Division Semifinal at Bradley Center to register the franchise's sixth postseason sweep.

**MAY 30, 2007**

The Wolves stay in the AHL's West Division after the league realigns its two-conference, four-division format to expand to 29 teams for the 2007-08 season. The Wolves will compete against two new rivals in the eight-team division: Quad City and Rockford.

**DEC. 15, 2007**

Center Kevin Doell scores three goals in a span of 77 seconds to register the fastest hat trick in Wolves history. His spree includes a converted penalty shot as Chicago ties franchise records for goals scored on the road and margin of defeat during a 10-2 dispatching of the Iowa Stars at Wells Fargo Arena.

**FEB. 16, 2008**

Goaltender Ondrej Pavelec stops 33 of 34 shots in a 4-1 victory over the Rockford IceHogs to pick up his 21st win of the season and surpass Kari Lehtonen's previous franchise rookie record of 20 wins.

**MARCH 3, 2008**

Ondrej Pavelec is named the AHL Goaltender of the Month for February – the first Chicago netminder in three years to earn the monthly honor – after leading the league with nine wins (9-2-1) and posting a 1.49 goals-against average and .949 save percentage in 12

outings that month.

**MARCH 22, 2008**

Head Coach John Anderson records his 500th regular-season victory behind the Wolves bench with a 3-1 win over the San Antonio Rampage at AT&T Center. The victory also marks his 300th AHL win.

**APRIL 1, 2008**

The Wolves clinch their fourth division title and claim the AHL's West Division crown for the second time with a 5-4 win over the Manitoba Moose at the MTS Centre.

**APRIL 11, 2008**

Center Jason Krog is honored with the Les Cunningham Award as the AHL's most valuable player for the 2007-08 season, which represents the second straight year the honor is bestowed upon a member of the Wolves. Two days later, Krog finishes the regular season as the third player in the AHL's 72-year history to earn the offensive "triple crown" as he tops the league in goals (39), assists (73) and points (112).

**APRIL 13, 2008**

With a 5-3 victory over Peoria at Allstate Arena, the Wolves complete their 14th regular season and earn the best record in the Western Conference. Jason Krog's empty-net goal with 24 seconds remaining, his 39th of the season, earns him the Willie Marshall Award as the regular-season goal-scoring leader and the John D. Sollenberger Trophy as the AHL's regular-season scoring leader.

**MAY 23, 2008**

The Wolves advance to their third Calder Cup Final and sixth league championship series in 11 years with a 4-2 victory over the Toronto Marlies in Game 5 of the Western Conference Finals at Allstate Arena.

**JUNE 1, 2008**

Captain Darren Haydar scores three points (2G, A) in Game 2 of the Calder Cup

Finals to become the most prolific scorer in Calder Cup history with 53 goals and 68 assists. He surpasses Jody Gage's AHL record for postseason goals (51) and Willie Marshall's all-time mark for points (119). That same night, blueliner Joel Kwiatkowski ties the AHL's all-time record for a defenseman by scoring a goal in his seventh consecutive game.

**JUNE 4, 2008**

Trailing 1-0 after the opening period, Chicago lights the lamp six straight times – including a postseason-record five goals in the second period – to run away with a 6-1 victory over the Wilkes-Barre/Scranton Penguins at Wachovia Arena at Casey Plaza and open a 3-0 lead in the Calder Cup Finals.

**JUNE 10, 2008**

The Wolves collect their fourth league title in 11 seasons and second Calder Cup championship with a 5-2 Game 6 victory over the Wilkes-Barre/Scranton Penguins in front of 9,808 fans at Allstate Arena. Center Jason Krog posts a hat trick as part of a four-point night and earns the Jack A. Butterfield Trophy as the MVP of the 2008 Calder Cup Playoffs. Rookie goaltender Ondrej Pavelek registers his 16th postseason win, the most in club history and tied for the most in AHL history for one postseason.

**JUNE 20, 2008**

Wolves head coach John Anderson is named head coach of the Atlanta Thrashers, the team's National Hockey League affiliate. After 11 years and four league titles, Anderson leaves as the winningest coach in Wolves history with 506 victories in 808 regular-season contests and 105 postseason wins.

**JULY 30, 2008**

The Wolves hold a press conference to name Downers Grove native Don Granato as the sixth head

coach in franchise history.

**AUG. 14, 2008**

Jason Shaver is named play-by-play announcer, becoming just the third person to hold that title; Shaver comes to the Wolves after serving in the same role for the AHL's Houston Aeros and Iowa Stars.

**JULY 7, 2009**

Chicago remains in the AHL's West Division after the league realigns its two-conference, four-division format for the 2009-10 season. The Wolves will face one new division rival, the Texas Stars, along with five traditional foes: the Houston Aeros, Milwaukee Admirals, Peoria Rivermen, Rockford IceHogs and San Antonio Rampage.

**AUG. 3, 2009**

Kevin Cheveldayoff departs the team after 12 seasons and four championships to become the assistant general manager for the NHL's Chicago Blackhawks.

**AUG. 6, 2009**

Wendell Young is named general manager after 15 seasons with the organization as a player, coach and executive.

**AUG. 11, 2009**

Vice President of Operations Courtney Mahoney is honored with the AHL's 2009 Ken McKenzie Award for outstanding promotion of the team.

**AUG. 12, 2009**

Bill Bentley is named assistant general manager and Gene Ubriaco assumes the role of senior advisor while continuing to serve as director of hockey operations.

**OCT. 19, 2009**

Head coach Don Granato and assistant coach Jason Christie are relieved of their duties in the wake of the team's 1-5-0-0 start.

**OCT. 20, 2009**

The Wolves announce the signing of 25-year NHL veteran Chris Chelios.

**OCT. 21, 2009**

The Wolves name Don Lever as the seventh head coach in franchise history while Ron Wilson is named assistant coach.

**FEB. 12, 2010**

When he scores the game-winning goal against the Texas Stars at Cedar Park Center in Austin, Jason Krog becomes the 79th player in AHL history to reach the 500-point mark.

**FEB. 20, 2010**

The Wolves host a banner-raising ceremony in recognition of long-time head coach John Anderson, who captured four league titles in 11 years behind the bench, prior to their game against the Houston Aeros at Allstate Arena.

**APRIL 9, 2010**

The Wolves clinch their fifth division title as they claim the West Division crown despite a loss to the Milwaukee Admirals at Bradley Center.

**JUNE 16, 2010**

The Wolves remain in the AHL's West Division after the league realigns its two-conference, four-division format for the 2010-11 season. The Wolves will face one new division rival, the Oklahoma City Barons, along with six traditional foes: the Houston Aeros, Milwaukee Admirals, Peoria Rivermen, Rockford IceHogs, San Antonio Rampage and Texas Stars.

**JULY 8, 2010**

The Wolves are named the recipient of the AHL's President's Award, given annually to a team in honor of excellence in all areas off the ice. The club also wins the Sponsorship Sales Department of the Year award.

**DEC. 18, 2010**

Center Jason Krog records his 300th career point as a member of the Wolves, becoming just the third player in franchise history (Steve Maltai, Rob Brown)

to do so.

**MARCH 11, 2011**

Forward Tim Miller matches Tim Stapleton's franchise record for fastest goal to start a game when he scores nine seconds into a home game against Peoria.

**APRIL 2, 2011**

Right wing Darren Haydar becomes the 41st player in the AHL's 75-year history to record 250 career goals.

**JUNE 27, 2011**

The Wolves hold a press conference to announce a two-year affiliation agreement with the NHL's Vancouver Canucks. The Atlanta Thrashers, the Wolves' affiliate for their first 10 years in the AHL, were sold and relocated to Winnipeg.

**JULY 5, 2011**

The Wolves are moved into the newly created Midwest Division after the AHL realigns its two-conference format to expand from four to six divisions; the Wolves will compete against one new rival in the five-team Midwest Division – the Charlotte Checkers – and three traditional foes: the Milwaukee Admirals, Peoria Rivermen and Rockford IceHogs.

**JULY 7, 2011**

The Wolves are awarded the AHL's Sponsorship Sales Department of the Year award for the second straight season.

**AUG. 1, 2011**

Craig MacTavish is named the eighth head coach in franchise history after the contracts of Don Lever and Ron Wilson are not renewed; Karl Taylor is named assistant coach 10 days later.

**MARCH 4, 2012**

Right wing Darren Haydar records his 100th career goal as a member of the Wolves, joining Steve Maltai, Rob Brown and Brett Sterling as the only players to do so. Eighteen days later, Haydar becomes the fourth

player in team history to join the 300-point club.

**APRIL 13, 2012**

The Wolves clinch their sixth division title – and claim the AHL's Midwest Division crown for the first time – with a 7-5 win over the Grand Rapids Griffins at Van Andel Arena. Right wing Mark Mancari ties a franchise record by bagging his 10th game-winning goal of the season.

**APRIL 15, 2012**

The Wolves complete their 18th regular season with a 4-2 win over the Peoria Rivermen at Allstate Arena. Chicago sets a then-franchise record for fewest goals allowed in a season by surrendering just 193 during its 76-game slate.

**APRIL 19, 2012**

Darren Haydar collects two assists during Game 1 of the Western Conference Quarterfinals at San Antonio to move into sole possession of first place on the AHL's all-time postseason assist list.

**JUNE 26, 2012**

Scott Arniel is named the ninth head coach in franchise history after Craig MacTavish departs the organization 15 days earlier.

**JUNE 28, 2012**

Chicago remains in the AHL's Midwest Division after the AHL realigns its two-conference, six-division format for the 2012-13 season. The Wolves will face one new divisional rival, Grand Rapids, along with three traditional foes: Milwaukee, Peoria and Rockford.

**JULY 6, 2012**

Nolan Baumgartner, who served as the Wolves captain during the 2011-12 season, retires after 16 years of professional hockey and is hired as an assistant coach. Mike Foligno rounds out the Wolves coaching staff when he's named assistant coach 14 days later.

**JAN. 27, 2013**

Wolves chairman of the board Don Levin and former players Bob Nardella and Tim Breslin are inducted into the Illinois Hockey Hall of Fame.

**FEB. 16, 2013**

The Wolves host a banner-raising ceremony in recognition of longtime general manager Kevin Cheveldayoff, who captured four league titles in 12 years as the head of Chicago's hockey operations.

**FEB. 23, 2013**

The Wolves become the second-fastest franchise – and 22nd overall – in the 77-year history of the AHL to reach the 500-win plateau with their 3-0 shutout victory over Peoria at Carver Arena. Chicago needed just 925 regular-season tilts to earn its 500th win. Only the Hartford Wolf Pack (915 games) reached the mark sooner.

**APRIL 23, 2013**

The Wolves announce a partnership with the NHL's St. Louis Blues through the 2015-16 season. The team's previous affiliate, Vancouver, purchased and relocated the Peoria Rivermen to Utica, New York.

**JULY 11, 2013**

President of Business Operations Mike Gordon earns the AHL's James C. Hendy Memorial Award as the league's outstanding executive for the 2012-13 season. The Wolves organization also receives an award for providing the most outstanding fan experience in the Western Conference. The league also announces a realignment of its two-conference, six-division format for 2013-14. The Wolves will face one new division rival, the Iowa Wild, along with three traditional foes: the Grand Rapids Griffins, Milwaukee Admirals and Rockford

IceHogs.

**JULY 15, 2013**

The Wolves hold a press conference to announce the return of John Anderson as the team's head coach. Chicago also announces Dave Allison and Scott Allen will join Anderson on the bench as his assistants.

**OCT. 1, 2013**

The Wolves announce a broadcast partnership with WCUI and The U-Too that allows 72 regular-season games to be available in high definition for the first time.

**APRIL 16, 2014**

With a 4-3 shootout victory over Iowa, Wolves head coach John Anderson achieves his 700th regular-season win since starting his coaching career at Winston-Salem (SHL) in 1995-96.

**APRIL 17, 2014**

Jake Allen receives the 2013-14 Aldege "Baz" Bastien Memorial Award as the league's most outstanding goaltender and becoming the first Wolves netminder to win the honor. Allen finishes the regular season as the league leader in wins (33), goals-against average (2.03) and save percentage (.928). He is the second AHL goaltender since 1984-85 to achieve the "Triple Crown."

**AUG. 25, 2014**

Mark Hardy and Brad Tapper are named assistant coaches for the upcoming season.

**NOV. 28, 2014**

Head coach John Anderson leads the Wolves to his 363rd regular-season AHL win to take over sole possession of fifth place among the league's all-time winningest coaches, passing Terry Reardon.

**JAN. 10, 2015**

Head coach John Anderson is behind the bench for his 1,000th regular-season

game with the Wolves. He goes 569-318-24-89 in the first 1,000.

**MAY 12, 2015**

The Wolves remain in the AHL's Midwest Division after the league realigns to two conferences and four divisions for the 2015-16 season. Joining the Wolves in the division are the Charlotte Checkers, Grand Rapids Griffins, Iowa Wild, Lake Erie Monsters, Manitoba Moose, Milwaukee Admirals and Rockford IceHogs.

**NOV. 12, 2015**

Head coach John Anderson earns his 750th head coaching victory as the Wolves knock off the Manitoba Moose 5-3 at MTS Centre. The win also serves as Anderson's 599th with Chicago and his 399th in the AHL while leading the team.

**NOV. 22, 2015**

Head coach John Anderson reaches 600 victories with Chicago and 400 AHL victories as the Wolves edge the Iowa Wild 2-1 at Allstate Arena.

**FEB. 1, 2016**

Captain Pat Cannone scores three goals to lead the Central Division to the inaugural AHL All-Star Challenge title at Onondaga County War Memorial Arena in Syracuse, New York. Cannone received the MVP trophy after the Central Division's 4-0 title-game win over the Atlantic Division. The AHL's new All-Star format featured the league's four divisions playing a round-robin to determine which teams advanced to the finals. The nine-minute games featured four minutes, 20 seconds of 4-on-4 action before shifting to 3-on-3 play. Wolves defenseman Andre Benoit added a goal and two assists for the Central Division.

**APRIL 2, 2016**

Prior to the Wolves' home game against the Lake Erie Monsters, defenseman

Andre Benoit receives the Tim Breslin Unsung Hero Award for best exemplifying Breslin's on-ice spirit, team-first attitude and community involvement.

**APRIL 9, 2016**

Wolves captain Pat Cannone is presented with the Dan Snyder Man of the Year Award in front of more than 10,000 fans at Allstate Arena prior to the team's 4-3 win over Grand Rapids. Cannone earns the honor for his all-encompassing commitment to charitable work throughout the Chicago area.

**JUNE 29, 2016**

The Wolves announce Craig Berube as the ninth head coach in team annals. Berube joins the Wolves after spending 11 seasons as a coach in the Philadelphia Flyers organization, including two years as the Flyers' head coach. Four weeks later, Darryl Sydor and Daniel Tkaczuk are announced as Berube's assistants.

**APRIL 14, 2017**

Kenny Agostino earns the Les Cunningham Award as the AHL's Most Valuable Player during the regular season. The 24-year-old forward receives the honor as the league leader in points (83) and assists (55).

**APRIL 15, 2017**

On the final day of the regular season, the Wolves seize their fourth division title in the last eight years as they deliver a 4-3 overtime victory over the Charlotte Checkers at Allstate Arena. The Wolves finish the year with 101 points, one ahead of the Grand Rapids Griffins in the Central Division race.

**APRIL 16, 2017**

Wade Megan collects the Willie Marshall Award as the AHL's leading goal-scorer (33) while Kenny Agostino claims the John B. Sollenberger Trophy as the league's top point-producer

(83). It's the first time the Wolves pick up both honors since Jason Krog earned both in 2007-08.

**MAY 16, 2017**

The Wolves sign a multi-year agreement to be partners with the Vegas Golden Knights, the new National Hockey League franchise that begins play during the 2017-18 season.

**JUNE 7, 2017**

The Wolves and Vegas Golden Knights announce Rocky Thompson as the 10th head coach in Wolves franchise history. Thompson joins Chicago after guiding the Ontario Hockey League's Windsor Spitfires to the 2017 Memorial Cup. Hired as assistants a month later, Chris Dennis and Bob Nardella complete the coaching staff for the 2017-18 campaign.

**DEC. 27, 2017**

The Wolves rack up the 1,000th regular-season win in franchise history with a 3-2 overtime triumph at Milwaukee. Defenseman Jake Walman scores 65 seconds into the extra session to earn the victory while goaltender Max Lagace posts 26 saves.

**FEB. 11, 2018**

On a sunny but chilly afternoon in Rosemont's Entertainment District, the Wolves host their first outdoor practice. After watching the team zip through some drills, a crowd of fans young and old joins the Wolves on the ice for a free skate.

**APRIL 12, 2018**

The AHL announces Wolves forward Scooter Vaughan has been selected as the winner of the Yanick Dupre Memorial Award that goes to the league's Man of the Year. Vaughan receives the honor for his outstanding contributions to Chicago-area community and charitable organizations.

**APRIL 13, 2018**

The Wolves become the

only AHL team during the 2017-18 season to repeat as division champs with a 6-4 victory at Rockford. Teemu Pulkkinen and T.J. Tynan produce two goals apiece and Beau Bennett hands out two assists as the Wolves clinch the Central Division crown.

**AUG. 13, 2018**

The Wolves host a daylong celebration in downtown Chicago to kick off the start of their 25th anniversary season and reveal the franchise's new Last Team Standing slogan. Many of the organization's greatest players, coaches and executives joins fans at Pioneer Plaza (next to the Michigan Avenue bridge) for a popular event capped after dusk with a massive pyro show delivered by Strictly FX.

**OCT. 14, 2018**

Governor Bruce Rauner declares this date to be "Chicago Wolves Day" throughout the state of Illinois for the organization's success on the ice as well as its charitable works. Rauner's lengthy proclamation concludes with "Therefore, I, Bruce Rauner, Governor of the State of Illinois, do hereby recognize October 14, 2018, as CHICAGO WOLVES DAY in Illinois, celebrating the team's 25 years of sport, talent and charity."

**APRIL 6, 2019**

The Wolves clinch their third straight Central Division title with a 3-2 victory over the Colorado Eagles at Allstate Arena. Center Gage Quinney scores with 1:13 left in regulation to give the Wolves their only lead of the night. Goaltender Oscar Dansk stops 30 shots to pick up his 26th win of the season.

**APRIL 19, 2019**

Prior to the Wolves' Calder Cup Playoffs opener against the Grand Rapids Griffins at Allstate Arena, left wing Daniel

Carr receives the Les Cunningham Award as the American Hockey League's Most Valuable Player. Carr becomes the fourth Wolves player in 13 years to be voted this honor after stacking up 30 goals and 41 assists in just 52 regular-season games.

**MAY 25, 2019**

Max Lagace becomes the first goaltender in Wolves history - as well as AHL Calder Cup Playoffs history - to score a goal. Lagace is credited with the goal that gives the Wolves a 4-2 Game 5 lead at 10:49 of the third period at San Diego. The Gulls remove their goaltender after a delayed penalty gets called on the Wolves. Moments after Lagace blocks a shot, a Gulls forward passes the puck from a spot in front of the Wolves bench and it slides between two defensemen all the way into their net. As the last Wolves player to touch the puck, Lagace receives credit for the goal.

**MAY 27, 2019**

The Wolves capture the AHL's Western Conference title and earn their fourth Calder Cup Finals appearance with a 3-1 triumph in Game 6 over the San Diego Gulls at Allstate Arena. After 52 minutes of scoreless hockey, forwards Curtis McKenzie and Keegan Kolesar score 19 seconds apart to spark the Wolves' third straight win to wrap up the series.

**NOV. 10, 2019:**

Elmhurst native Garrett Sparks sets the franchise record for the longest scoreless streak as the goaltender goes 191 minutes and 14 seconds without allowing a goal. Sparks stops 115 consecutive shots during the streak, which begins Oct. 23 against the Texas Stars and includes back-to-back shutouts of the Tucson Roadrunners (Oct. 30) and Iowa Wild (Nov. 7) before concluding on this date versus the Rockford

IceHogs.

#### NOV. 19, 2019:

The Wolves host their 1,000th regular-season home game at Allstate Arena.

#### MARCH 12, 2020:

One day after the NBA shuts down due to COVID-19's spread, Wolves owner Don Levin consults with Illinois Governor JB Pritzker and announces the Wolves are canceling their final eight regular-season home games. Hours later, the AHL announces it has suspended play indefinitely.

#### MAY 11, 2020:

AHL president and CEO David Andrews announces the league has canceled the rest of the 2019-20 season as well as the Calder Cup Playoffs. It marks the first time in the AHL's 84-year history that it concludes a season without determining a champion. The Wolves finish fourth in the Central Division after playing 61 of their 76 games.

#### DEC. 30, 2020:

AHL president and CEO Scott Howson announces the league has approved the structural framework for an AHL season that will begin on Feb. 5, 2021.

#### JAN. 4, 2021:

AHL president and CEO Scott Howson announces the 2020-21 season will include 28 teams when it gets underway on Feb. 5. The Milwaukee Admirals, Springfield Thunderbirds and Charlotte Checkers opt not to play in the upcoming season. All three teams express plans to return in 2021-22. Additionally, the league will consist of five divisions instead of the standard four. The divisions will be: Atlantic, Canadian, North, Central and Pacific.

#### JAN. 7, 2021:

The Wolves announce they have reached an agreement with the National Hockey League's Nashville Predators and Carolina Hurricanes on a partnership for the 2020-21 AHL season. The Wolves' one-year affiliation with Nashville allows the Predators to loan Chicago players who normally

would suit up for Milwaukee.

#### MAY 12, 2021:

First-year forward David Cotton records his first hat trick and rookie goaltender Beck Warm stops 35 shots as the Chicago Wolves clinch their fourth division title in five years with a 7-0 victory over the Grand Rapids Griffins at Van Andel Arena.

#### NOV. 26, 2021:

Trailing 3-0 after two periods at Grand Rapids, the Wolves score five unanswered goals to win in regulation for the first time in team history when trailing by 3 or more in the third period. The victory triggers a franchise-record-tying 12-game winning streak and puts the Wolves in the Central Division lead for good.

#### APRIL 26, 2022

The Wolves clinch the AHL's Central Division crown for the fifth time in six years with a 6-4 win at Texas. Stefan Noesen records his franchise-record 11th game-winning goal as part of a 3-point night (2G, A) while defensemen Joey Keane and Max Lajoie and forwards Richard Panik and Josh Leivo also score for the Wolves.

#### APRIL 28, 2022

The AHL announces that captain Andrew Poturalski and alternate captain Stefan Noesen have been voted to the 2021-22 AHL First All-Star Team by the league's players, coaches and media. It marks the third time in the team's 21-year league history that two Wolves make the first team – joining Darren Haydar and Brett Sterling (2006-07) and Kenny Agostino and Wade Megan (2016-17).

#### APRIL 30, 2022

On the final day of the regular season at Rockford, captain Andrew Poturalski sets up Stefan Noesen for a goal 10:51 into the game to become the first AHL player since 2010 to record 100 points in a season. Later in the game, Poturalski sets up Noesen again as the latter finishes the year with 48 goals – the most in the AHL since 2010. The Wolves' 3-2 win over Rockford, when

coupled with Stockton's 3-1 loss at Bakersfield, means the Wolves capture their first Macgregor Kilpatrick Trophy that goes to the AHL team with the best regular-season record.

#### MAY 1, 2022

The AHL announces that the Wolves sweep the league's individual regular-season trophies. Andrew Poturalski claims his second consecutive John B. Sollenberger Trophy as the league's top point-producer (28G, 73A), Stefan Noesen wins the Willie Marshall Award as the league's top goal-scorer (48G) and Alex Lyon takes home the Harry "Hap" Holmes Award that goes to the goaltender(s) who plays at least 25 games for the team with the AHL's best goals-against average.

#### JUNE 14, 2022

Rookie goaltender Pyotr Kochetkov records 28 saves for his first shutout in North America while Ivan Lodnia, Andrew Poturalski and Josh Leivo score in the third period to give the Wolves a 3-0 victory over the Stockton Heat in Game 6 of the Western Conference Finals that sends Chicago to its second consecutive Calder Cup Finals. The Wolves become the first team since the 2009-10 Hershey Bears to qualify for two straight Finals.

#### JUNE 25, 2022

After suffering an overtime loss to the Springfield Thunderbirds in Game 1 of the Calder Cup Finals, the Wolves overwhelm the Thunderbirds with four straight wins capped by a 4-0 triumph in Game 5 at MassMutual Center in Springfield. Goaltender Alex Lyon stops 28 shots as he and Pyotr Kochetkov become the first pair in AHL history to each fashion a shutout in Finals play. Defenseman Max Lajoie and forwards Andrew Poturalski, David Gust and Josh Leivo score the goals as the Wolves trigger a celebration that lasts all night in Massachusetts. Leivo, who sets a franchise post-season record with 15 goals to go with 14 assists, earns the Jack A. Butterfield Trophy as the post-season Most Valuable

Player.

#### AUG 23, 2022

Brock Sheahan is named the 12th coach in franchise history.

#### MARCH 8, 2023

Pyotr Kochetkov scores a goal, becoming the 20th goaltender in AHL history to record a goal in a game.

#### JUNE 13, 2023

Bob Nardella is named the 13th head coach in franchise history after being promoted from assistant coach, a position which he's held since 2017.

#### FEB. 13, 2024

Chris Terry is named the 16th captain in franchise history.

#### MAY 2, 2024

The Wolves announced that the American Hockey League organization has signed a three-year partnership agreement with the National Hockey League's Carolina Hurricanes that begins with the upcoming 2024-25 season. The affiliation renews the relationship between the Wolves and the Hurricanes, who were paired from '20-23 before Chicago became an independent AHL team during the '23-24 campaign.

#### May 3, 2024

Wendell Young is named Vice Chairman/Governor of the team.

#### June 20, 2024

Cam Abbott is named the 14th head coach in franchise history. The 40-year-old previously served as the head coach of Rogle BK of the Swedish Hockey League from 2017-23

#### June 11, 2025

Scott Morrow and forward Bradly Nadeau are named to the 2024-25 AHL Top Prospects Team.

**DON LEVIN****CHAIRMAN OF THE BOARD / GOVERNOR**

Don Levin founded DRL Enterprises, Inc., in 1969. The Glenview-based company has holdings in many industries including tobacco processing, aircraft and medical equipment leasing, licensed sports product manufacturing and distribution, and motion picture production and distribution.

Levin's film company has made nearly 20 motion pictures distributed in the U.S. and overseas. His films have featured such stars as Emilio Estevez, Charlie Sheen, Sharon Stone, Rodney Dangerfield and Chuck Norris.

Levin founded the Chicago Wolves in January 1994 and has served as the team's chairman of the board since the franchise's inception. Levin donates his time and serves on the board of directors for several charitable organizations.

Levin dedicates a good portion of his time and energy to helping dogs find forever homes. The Wolves host Adopt-a-Dog Night one Saturday each month during the season and make it easy for fans to adopt homeless dogs.

The Adopt-A-Dog program has found homes for 1,700 dogs in its first 19 seasons. In 2003, Levin purchased and donated the Animobile – a mobile adoption unit and a modern clinic staffed by Chicago of Animal Care and Control veterinarians and adoption specialists. In 2014, he pledged a \$2 million donation to CACC to spur an \$8.2 million renovation.

Levin was inducted into the Illinois Hockey Hall of Fame on Jan. 27, 2013. He was honored as the International Hockey League's Executive of the Year for the 1999-2000 season, which concluded with the franchise's second of four championships.

Before beginning his business career, Levin served in the United States Marine Corps, from which he was honorably discharged.

# WAYNE MESSMER

Senior Executive Vice President

Best known for his stirring rendition of the National Anthem, Wayne Messmer sings the anthem prior to almost every Wolves home game. The Senior Executive Vice President also plays a crucial role in the team's business operations and promotional work in the community.

Messmer's association with sports began as the announcer/soloist with the Chicago Sting soccer team. From 1982-85, the Chicago native served as field announcer and soloist for the Chicago White Sox and he has maintained a professional association with the Chicago Cubs since 1985. Messmer also spent 13 seasons as the celebrated soloist for the Chicago Blackhawks. His performance prior to the 1991 NHL All-Star Game at Chicago Stadium continues to be recognized by fans as one of the greatest moments in hockey.

During the Wolves historic home opener on Oct. 14, 1994, Messmer made an emotional return to his craft. Before a sellout crowd at Allstate Arena, he sang the anthem publicly for the first time since he suffered a gunshot wound to the throat six months earlier.

Messmer is the founder of Wayne Messmer & Associates, a nationally recognized financial services firm. He is a graduate of Illinois Wesleyan University in Bloomington, where he received a bachelor's degree in music education, and Loyola University of Chicago, where he earned a master's degree in counseling. Messmer also earned his Ph.D. in psychology from La Salle University. He is a member of the National Speakers Association (NSA) and the Screen Actors Guild-American Federation of Television and Radio Artists (SAG-AFTRA). In July 2015, he received the Certified Speaking Professional designation from the National Speakers Association, which is the NSA's highest award.

Messmer and his wife, Kathleen, have two daughters – Jennifer and Stephanie – and live in Glenview.

# WENDELL YOUNG

Vice Chairman/Governor

After 15 seasons as general manager of the Wolves, Wendell Young was promoted to Vice Chairman/Governor on May 3, 2024.

During Young's stint as GM, which began in August of 2009, the Wolves captured the 2022 Calder Cup (after earning the 2022 Macgregor Kilpatrick Trophy for compiling the league's best regular-season record) and reached the 2019 Calder Cup Finals.

Young also helped capture eight American Hockey League division titles: the 2010 West, 2012 Midwest, 2014 Midwest, 2017 Central, 2018 Central, 2019 Central, 2021 Central and 2022 Central.

Young has been a member of the Wolves organization in virtually every capacity – including player, coach and executive – since the team's inaugural campaign in 1994.

Young stands as the Wolves' all-time leader among goaltenders in games (322), wins (169), saves (8,467), minutes (17,912) and shutouts (16), and was a member of Chicago's 1998 and 2000 Turner Cup championship squads. His jersey number "1" was retired on Dec. 1, 2001 – becoming the first Wolves player to receive the honor.

He is currently the only player in hockey history to have won the Memorial Cup, Calder Cup, Turner Cup and Stanley Cup.

# GENE UBRIACO

Senior Advisor/Director of Hockey Operations

Gene Ubriaco has been with the Wolves since the franchise's inception in 1994 and has served for the last 28 seasons as the team's director of hockey operations and the last 16 as senior advisor. Ubriaco served as the Wolves' first head coach and guided the expansion team to a 34-33-14 record and a berth in the 1995 Turner Cup playoffs.

"Ubie" began his coaching career at Lake Superior State University in 1972-73. Four years later, he led the Milwaukee Admirals to the Turner Cup playoffs to become the first International Hockey League coach to guide an expansion team into the postseason.

In 1988-89, Ubriaco moved on to the National Hockey League to coach the Pittsburgh Penguins. Under his tutelage, the Penguins shattered several team records and advanced to the Stanley Cup Playoffs after a seven-year absence. He posted a 50-47-9 record with Pittsburgh.

The Sault Ste. Marie, Ontario, native also played professional hockey for 10 years, which included three seasons in the NHL with the Penguins (1967-68), Oakland Seals (1968-69) and Chicago Blackhawks (1969-70). He posted 39 goals, 35 assists and 74 points in 177 regular-season games.



Ubriaco began his career with the Chicago Wolves as the team's first head coach. Since then, Ubriaco has spent time with the Wolves in all facets of operations, including director of hockey operations and senior advisor.

# BILL BENTLEY

Assistant General Manager

Bill Bentley is in his 17th season as the Chicago Wolves' assistant general manager and stands as one of a handful of people who have been with the organization since the team's inception in 1994.

## DAN PRICE

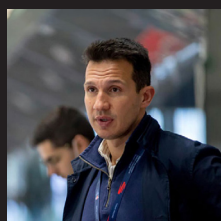
Assistant Coach

## BILL GARDNER

Color Analyst

Bill Gardner has served as the Chicago Wolves' color analyst since 2002.

Gardner spent six years as a color analyst in the National Hockey League, including four years alongside Pat Foley with the Chicago Blackhawks from 1998-2002. The Toronto native returned to the Blackhawks, where he played parts of eight seasons, after a two-year stint as the TV color analyst with the Carolina Hurricanes (1997-98) and the Hartford Whalers (1996-97). Gardner began his broadcasting career as a studio analyst for the Blackhawks on SportsChannel Chicago from 1993-96.

A nine-year NHL veteran, Gardner was drafted 49th overall by the Blackhawks in 1979. The former center notched 70 goals and 175 points in six seasons with the Blackhawks – which included an NHL-career-high 51 points in 1984-85 – before being traded to Hartford during the 1985-86 season. The Blackhawks re-signed Gardner as a free agent in 1987 and he played in Chicago's organization for the next two seasons before retiring in 1989. He finished his NHL career with 73 goals and 188 points in 380 games. Gardner also played two seasons in the American Hockey League with the New Brunswick Hawks (1980-81) and Binghamton Whalers (1986-87) and posted 36 goals and 109 points in 98 games.
